

Mission and Investments



Federal Budget 2023:

- Approval of the Corporation's funding (2023-2028)
- Confirmation of funding to reconfigure the Bonaventure Expy. into a boulevard (over 8 years), which includes revitalizing part of the shoreline in Montreal

MISSION

Ensure user mobility, safety, and infrastructure longevity using a systemic management approach based on sustainable development

82,000,000 annual trips

including **543,000** active mobility trips (2022)



A Dedicated Mobility Team



187 people: multidisciplinary team

\$157.5M invested in major work

JCCBI:

Innovation, Research and Knowledge



+ Alternatives to deicing salts:

- Adverse impacts on materials and the environment
- Research into alternatives: eliminate or reduce

+ Research programs:

- Evolving knowledge: infrastructure maintenance
- Deconstruction of the original Champlain Bridge
 - + 12 research projects
 - + Annual forum with researchers
- Evaluation of seismic performance: Jacques Cartier Bridge, Honoré Mercier Bridge, Bonaventure Expressway and Melocheville Tunnel







Connected to the Community



- + JCCBI's participatory process 3 groups
 - **Partners:** Municipalities, government departments and other institutional partners (City of Montreal and the Mohawk Nation of Kahnawà:ke)
 - Interest groups, associations, etc.
 - General public
 - Various channels to promote transparent communication and constructive discussions with everyone
- + Donations and sponsorships: \$29,500
- + JCCBI team: nearly \$12,000 for the Centraide of Greater Montreal campaign




Jacques Cartier Bridge: \$37.2M



Main work

- + Steel/painting repair and reinforcement program: below the deck and splash zone of the superstructure
- Plans and specifications: work to maintain and preserve the Île Sainte-Hélène Pavilion
- Work to manage drained water and redevelop the land:
 Montreal sector
- + Prefeasibility study:
 - Demolition of the old toll booth (Longueuil side) and redevelopment of adjacent land
 - Active mobility service offer
- Equipment added to the sidewalk and multipurpose path to improve the user experience and safety



Deconstruction of the Original Champlain Bridge \$93.4M





The main work is being done by **Nouvel Horizon Saint-Laurent G.P.**

- + Deconstruction of 16 spans, 28 piers and 38 footings: marine deconstruction work completed
- Demolition of spans, piers and footings (above and next to Hwy. 132)
- + Take-down of the suspended span (located over the St. Lawrence Seaway)
- Deconstruction of the central portion of the bridge, dike sector and east side

Duration: 43 months


Scheduled end date: January 2024



Deconstruction in 5 Phases

- 1. **Deconstruction** of the original bridge
- 3. Repurpose 287,000 tonnes of material (concrete, steel, asphalt): Prioritize reuse and recycling and provide traceability
- 4. 12 R&D projects: Advance knowledge
- 5. Héritage Champlain: Redevelop land along the shoreline freed up by the deconstruction
 - Provide access to the river
 - Commemorate the original bridge

Héritage Champlain will end in December 2025





Bonaventure Sector: \$7.2M



Main work

- + No major projects in 2022-2023
- + Prefeasibility studies completed:
 - Reconfiguration of the expressway into a boulevard
 - Maintenance of the Clément Bridge
 - Maintenance of elevated lanes
- Plans and specifications: Deconstruction of the Île des Sœurs Bypass Bridge


Solution Bonaventure - \$0.6M

 Help protect the river from the runoff of contaminated groundwater



Honoré Mercier Bridge: \$19M






Main work

- Pier repairs
- Replacement of the paint system on part of the steel structure
- Replacement of a section of the platforms used for inspection work
- + Prefeasibility studies:
 - Pier repairs
 - Replacement of paint system
 - Deck paving
- Consultation with the Kahnawà:ke population: pathway project



Estacade and Melocheville Tunnel: \$0.7M






Estacade

- No major work
- Prefeasibility studies: strategically extend the structure's lifespan

Melocheville Tunnel

- + No major work
- + Prefeasibility study: west bridge (P-113) located at the tunnel's west approach


Financial management principles

- + Thoroughness, compliance and transparency
- Stringent procurement and contract administration processes to soundly manage public funds



Highlights





- + New accounting standard PS 3280 Asset Retirement Obligations = adjustment of 2021-2022 financial statements
- 2023 budget and funding for the Bonaventure Expressway reconfiguration project:
 - Significant increase in environmental liability and operating expenses
 - + \$100M decrease in accumulated surplus
- + Reduced revenues: transfer of tangible capital assets concluded with the Government of Quebec (previous fiscal year)
- Related party transactions in the amount of \$12.4M from intergovernmental transfers related to infrastructure and land management
